Featuring "The Branches Center"

The Branches Center (1304 Route 47 South in Rio Grande) is a place where homeless, elderly,



and marginalized individuals can go to receive a warm welcome and a wide range of services from people who truly care about them. Started over a decade ago by St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Stone Harbor, it was a place for coffee and chat, but it expanded. I met with Sandra Lockhart, the Director of The Branches, on a frigid Monday morning to talk about the organization. (Although they usually close at 1:30pm, The Branches was staying open until 6:00pm to provide a warm place for people to sit.) They have a staff and a number of volunteers whom Ms. Lockhart highly praised.

Clients are offered a full range of services. These include breakfast and lunch each day, a shower, laundry facilities, haircuts, clothing, and even the attention of a

chiropractor. They have a Food Bank that clients can access by filling out a grocery list which is then fulfilled by a volunteer or staff member. For those who cannot get to the meals or Food Bank, The Branches delivers groceries Mondays and Fridays, mostly to people housed temporarily in nearby motels. Advocates work with clients to help them navigate the labyrinthine State and County social services, including housing, food stamps, veterans' benefits, and more. In addition, the advocates help with legal questions and scheduling



doctor appointments. Special activities are planned for children, such as Christmas and Easter celebrations

and a water slide and bouncy house in the summer.



The Branches has a long list of supporters, including the Church and local businesses and organizations, as well as individuals. A small sampling of these includes Acme, Lehigh Dairy, and the Elks. One amazing example of benefactors jumping in to serve involved a family that had been living in a motel. The Branches staff were able to find permanent housing for them. Ms. Lockhart went onto the organization's Facebook site and asked for furniture. By the end of the same day, the house was completely furnished with donations.

The Branches will soon be located in a beautiful newly-refurbished, state-of-the-art building across the

street. The staff and volunteers are in the process of moving and hope to be fully operational within a month or two. A tour of the facility showed how they will be able to further expand the services they offer. There are more and newer showers, well-displayed clothing to choose from, industrial-sized washer/dryer, and a large sunlit room for meals and other activities. The staff and volunteers plan to offer after-school study/homework assistance (there are retired teachers already lined up to help). There is a lending library and there will be a computer lab where volunteers will help people with their resumés and job searches. The large kitchen has warming ovens to heat the meals that will be served. The Food Bank will remain in the old location but will be expanded and will have grocery carts that people can roll through the shelves to collect their own groceries.

Membership Committee Update

The Membership Committee's main purpose is to retain and increase membership in SHPOA. We currently have 1,023 properties as members, representing 32% of the 3,164 property owners in Stone Harbor and our goal for 2022 is to increase this to 1,200.

Our renewal efforts include monthly reminders to delinquent members. The Communications & Technology Committee's idea of including membership expiration dates on the bottom of each communication sent to members has become the driving force for renewals; a gentle reminder to busy people. We are thrilled that the majority of our renewals are for multi-years, with the \$100-4 year membership being the most popular.

Our efforts to gain new members has traditionally been through a yearly mail campaign to all non-members. This is our biggest volunteer effort and our biggest budget item. The campaign is typically successful, and we are boosting this effort this spring to personally inform non-members about SHPOA. Through various Trustees and the excellent help from our CIO, Homi Kapadia, we are launching a block captain campaign. Look for your Trustee neighbor knocking on doors in your neighborhood! And you can help them by letting your neighbors know about our mission to be your "Voice in Stone Harbor".

SHPOA's Membership Committee meets monthly and consists of 4 Trustees: Beth Ann Griesser, Mantura Gallagher, Joe Maurer and myself. We also are fortunate to have Paul Grady, SHPOA's Treasurer, as our liaison to the Executive Committee and Jay Blackman as our liaison to the Communications & Technology Committee. Paul's a SHPOA veteran and we are grateful for his intuitive and wise guidance.

Spring Beach Sweep Update

The state wide spring Beach Sweep organized by Clean Ocean Action was



conducted on Saturday, April 9th. A damp chill in the air didn't dissuade over 60 volunteers from participating in Stone Harbor. A common and reoccurring theme was that most beaches were generally clean and that most of the trash was removed from the dunes. This spring we collected thirty 30-gallon bags of trash and five 13-gallon bags of recycle (> 500 lb.), a considerable increase from last fall.

We noticed there were many dog waste bags, which was

concerning as the Borough provides specific receptacles for this waste. Plastic bottles, food/candy wrappers, cigarette filters, and pieces of foam/plastic were among the most common items collected. Most cigarette filters on our smoke-free beaches are at the beach entrances, and we can encourage the Borough for additional ways to combat this.

With an increase in trash and debris along the beach front, presumably from the increase in construction, it is suggested that all beach front construction project managers be made aware of this, so we can address the issue before the





upcoming summer season.

This year's Beach Sweep commercial sponsors included Bank of America, Brother, Shop Rite, and Think Green. Participating organizations in addition to SHPOA included the Wetlands Institute, Girls Scouts Troop 94230, the Borough of Stone Harbor, Emmaus High School and Rutgers Prep. A special thanks to Stone Harbor Public Works who supplied equipment to help with our efforts.

SHPOA Survey regarding the use of beach front site at Villa Maria




Thank you to all who responded to our SHPOA member survey regarding the potential use of the Borough owned beach front site at Villa Maria.

By way of background, Stone Harbor Borough Council and Borough Administration have been discussing options regarding the 35' x 110' lot at 112th Street and First Avenue in concert with current construction plans for property that was the Villa Maria convent. Villa Maria was a 250-bed retreat house on 111th Street in Stone Harbor which has now been demolished and is being turned into a new smaller retreat house along with 13 lots. Much discussion has been held regarding these various options. This survey was conducted from March 30th through April 3rd. Our members were asked to prioritize five potential outcomes and were provided a comment box to recommend any additional suggestions. Our members also had the ability to check a "No Way!" box if they felt they were absolutely against a given outcome. The survey was anonymous, but members could leave their name if they chose to.

Here are the summary results:



Overall, 587 of our SHPOA Members responded to the survey. A few observations by potential usage:

- Leaving "as is" for future consideration: 61% of respondents ranked this option as 1st or 2nd
- Preserving as open space: 82% ranked this option as 1st or 2nd
- Selling the lot through a bidding process for residential development: 48% said "No Way!"
- Developing the lot into public space with facilities for restrooms: 40% said "No Way!" though 28% ranked this option as 1st or 2nd
- Developing the lot into parking spaces: 62% said "No Way!" along with 21% that ranked this option
 4th or 5th

In addition 155 suggestions and comments were provided by many of our members, and besides open space which was in the lead, in no particular priority other ideas included a dog park, boat park, car park, water park, swimming pool, golf park, restrooms, sitting park, a sale to offset debt and taxes, a snack bar, café, low-cost rental lodging, and an entertainment/reception venue.

We sincerely hope the views of our SHPOA Members are factored into consideration as Borough Council and Administration makes its decision.



Ocean Wind Informational Forum Postponed

The Ocean Wind Informational forum, previously planned for mid May, is now postponed until the fall.



SHPOA and the Borough of Stone Harbor still plan to co-host the event. The rescheduling is due to several factors: 1) Orsted's inability to commit to a May date given other priorities, 2) New Jersey Bureau of Public Utilities (NJPBU) and New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) declining to participate due to "staff shortages", and 3) the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management's (BOEM) delay in the release of the off-shore wind Environmental Impact Statement. Although we are disappointed in the delay, the later date should allow for increased information exchange on Ocean Wind 2. This second Ocean Wind project, approved by NJBPU last June, is expected to be off the coast of 7 Mile Island.
