

STONE HARBOR – A borough resident, citing the damage caused by Tropical Storm Ophelia to the beaches, has urged the council to get back to considering recommendations for beach Geoff Woolery, a trustee of the Stone Harbor Property Owners Association, referenced what he termed a "pause" in the consideration by the borough of the recommendations in the feasibility study, aimed at defining beach projects that could help sand retention between large replenishment projects, at the Tuesday, Oct. 3, council meeting. "What a difference one storm can make," Woolery said. He spoke of areas where the storm had moved large amounts of new sand from the beaches to offshore sand bars.
